Last Month's Meeting—Building a 3D Printer from a Kit

Bill Ryder did a terrific job of explaining the process, warts and all, he went through to build a personal 3D printer from a kit. The biggest challenges stemmed from the fact that the kit he bought was in transition from one version to another so when he received the kit there were key parts missing which became apparent as he walked through the steps. The company's customer service was very responsive and delivered the missing parts quickly after being notified but it definitely slowed the building process down. What should have taken a few days at most ended up taking several months.

Bill ran the printer as he talked. The printer needs to be warmed up for about an hour before it could be producing an object. Bill showed us the software that's used to design the object to be built and to set the various criteria for the printer. Then as the printer built a small cup the software showed graphically where the printer was depositing the liquid plastic filament on the object and layering it in a continuous stream to build up the sides of the cup. The cup was a solid-sided object but Bill explained how one can build objects that have open areas by building a honeycomb matrix out of a water soluble plastic inside those open areas to serve as support for the solid part of the object above the "hole."

The audience was obviously interested and impressed so Bill promises to give a follow up presentation at a later time and Jack Ungerleider may join in the presentation as well as he has put together his personal 3D printer from a similar kit. Thanks, Bill, for a great presentation and expanding the knowledge of our group.

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3 Better Ways to Store Your Files than On the Desktop

Did you know that storing files directly on your desktop can harm your productivity? I used to be one of "those" people who downloaded files straight to the desktop. If you can identify with that, then



I have good news for you: you can do better. Desktop storage is simple, sure, but it comes with hidden drawbacks you may not know about.

Kick the bad habit with these alternative file storage methods. They may not be as convenient but I promise that you'll learn to love them in the long run.

The urge to save files to the desktop is understandable. It provides immediate access with a single click, which means that it's tempting to turn the desktop into a de facto headquarters for storage. But unless you are

strict with maintenance, you'll eventually succumb to these issues:

- **No file protection.** As noted by PC World, certain directories are not affected by System Restore, the most recognizable location being My Documents. Files on the desktop are affected by System Restore, which can result in unexpected file disappearances.
- **No file backups.** Many file backup programs ignore desktop files by default. Most programs worth their salt will allow you to change the settings and include the desktop if necessary, but all it


takes is one forgetful moment to accidentally lose an important desktop file.

•

Clutter, clutter, clutter. The story is always the same. You begin your desktop collection with a few documents. Over time, the collection grows to include images, music, programs, zip files, and more documents. Suddenly, finding the right document takes more time than actually opening it.

Separate Drive Partitions

One bit of computer wisdom that you should learn is this: "Never save data on the same partition as your operating system." In Windows, the location of the desktop on the file system does reside on the same partition as the operating system itself.



Why is this important advice? Because you want to avoid putting all of your eggs in the same basket.

Let's say that you happen to contract a mild virus or malware that attacks your operating system. It might wipe all files related to the operating system itself OR it may affect the entire partition that holds the operating system. By losing the operating


system, you lose all of your saved data as well.

But if you installed Windows to the C: partition and stored all of your files on the D: partition, your files on D: would be safe even if C: were wiped clean. The only way D: would be affected is if the physical hard drive itself was wiped or damaged.

One additional benefit of having separate partitions is that you can reinstall Windows without losing your saved data. Tina has written on the subject of resizing Windows partitions, so check it out if you want to take advantage of this feature. http://bit.ly/1lfBCDe

Use Windows Libraries

Every installation of Windows comes with a directory called My Documents. In Windows 7, it was renamed to Documents and came with a couple of buddies: Music, Pictures, and Videos. They're called libraries and you've probably seen them before, but never really used them, right? Well, you should reconsider.



In truth, these four libraries are special. They aren't just directories; they're collections of multiple directories. In each library, you can specify different directories to be included and that library will show the content from all included directories. It sounds more complicated than it is.

Think of it like this: You can save your videos to many different locations and link those directories to the Videos library. Then, whenever you access the Videos library, you'll see all of those files in one place. It's just as convenient as storing everything on the desktop, yet infinitely more flexible and organized. Store Files in the Cloud

Cloud storage has been a big buzz term over the past few years and for good reason. While cloud-related solutions like Dropbox, G+ Drive, or Microsoft OneDrive come with privacy concerns

http://bit.ly/1lzsQ4F>, they also offer many benefits and I think people are too quick to throw the baby out with the bathwater.



Here's how it works: You set aside one or more directories that automatically sync with whatever service you're using (comparison of cloud storage services). These files can be accessed from anywhere and they can be set to private or public.

Why is this better than storing straight on the desktop?

- Immediate backups. Due to automatic synchronization, you rarely need to worry about lost files. If your computer gets wiped somehow, those files still reside on the cloud and you can always retrieve them again.
- Revision history. Not every cloud service offers a revision history, but most do and it's an important feature. Basically, the service will track every change that's made to the file (it may be limited to the last X changes) and allow you to instantly revert to a past version if necessary.
- One Drive (aka SkyDrive) comes integrated with Windows 8 and can help you keep your files synced.

Need Quick Access to Files?

Sometimes convenience wins out over practicality and reason. The desktop is great because it allows for immediate access, right? With one small compromise, you can maintain that convenience. The answer is to use shortcuts.

Creating a shortcut is as simple as dragging a file using the right mouse button to where you want the shortcut to appear, then selecting Create shortcut here from the menu. Even if a shortcut gets wiped, the actual file will still be safe.

But instead of putting the shortcuts on the desktop, why not take it one step further?

Right click on any file shortcut and select either *Pin to taskbar* or *Pin to start menu*. It's a self-explanatory feature that works just as well as, if not better than, traditional desktop shortcuts. I use it day in and day out and I wouldn't have it any other way.

Conclusion

Ultimately, personal preference will always win. For those of you who have been "desktopping" for years, you'll probably find it near impossible to break the habit. I still do it from time to time, though I try my best to clean up after myself when I realize what I'm doing. It just doesn't make sense to store everything on the desktop anymore.

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Take Better Control of Your Computer with WinPatrol

about what he is putting on his machine.

Most PC users find that their computers tend to slow down as they age, with more programs loading at boot, toolbars spontaneously appearing on the browser, browsers running slow with too many unnecessary plug-ins, and a host of other issues. Fortunately for us, there is a great little utility that has been around for over 16 years that provides serious protection from software that tries to change your settings, install toolbars, or add other potentially unwanted content. This utility, WinPatrol, is not a traditional antivirus or anti-malware utility, but it does provide an additional layer of protection from unwanted programs or system modifications that are often installed when new or

updated software is installed. The highest recommendation that I can give for WinPatrol is that several years ago, I purchased a lifetime family license which allows the paid version of WinPatrol (WinPatrol Plus), to be installed on any and all Windows computers in my family, a fact that I rigidly enforce; all of our computers are actively running WinPatrol Plus, and will continue to do so in the future, even as new machines and operating systems replace older computers.

According to the WinPatrol website (winpatrol.com), "The popularity of WinPatrol is based on its ability to detect and prevent changes to important Windows settings. You'll be notified if unwanted programs are set to automatically run, if a toolbar has been added to Internet Explorer, if your home page, search provider or other internal configurations change. When a new Service or ActiveX component is detected it may be part of a legitimate program. WinPatrol will make sure it is and if it isn't, you can tell WinPatrol to disable it. Just adding a

program won't cause a notification, but when a program is configured to run without your knowledge, WinPatrol will let you confirm that the change is expected."

The need for a utility such as WinPatrol has increased significantly in recent years. Today, it is very common for all categories of software, including commercial (paid software), shareware, and freeware to create or enhance a revenue stream through commissions generated by installing often unrelated software and plug-ins. This unnecessary software or browser add-ons may change the user's home page on his browser, change default search providers, redirect commercial transactions to "preferred" sellers, add revenue generating toolbars to browsers, add software monitors that track and report user activities, and other "enhancements". Usually these unnecessary additions are installed with the nominal consent of the user, as the information about the system changes may be buried in the fine print of the license or users' agreement displayed during the install process to which the typical user clicks "agree" without fully understanding what he is actually installing on his computer. Alternatively, many of these software vendors and authors are dependent on the typical user clicking on the "next" button during the install process, without that user being fully cognizant

As a typical example, one of my favorite cleaning and maintenance utilities displays a window during its install process that says, "By clicking "install" you accept the ... Toolbar Terms of Use and Privacy Policy", with a hyperlink to the privacy policy. It is external revenue sources such as these

Multiple Computers?


Of course. You're the customer not your computer. You're welcome to use a single license code on any computer you personally own and use.

Purchase a WinPatrol Super Family Pack and your code is good for unlimited computers for your whole family. that enable the software authors and publishers to continue to produce and distribute their software, which is often free or inexpensive. In my experience, most users simply click on the large blue "Install" button instead of the small, underlined "Skip" link. By clicking on "Install", without changing any of the displayed default settings, the user consents to install the "... Toolbar & Extensions by Spigot (Slick-Savings in IE/FF/GC, Start Page in FF, Domain Error & eBay & Amazon Assistants in GC). Set Yahoo! As my default search provider, home page, & startup option in Internet Explorer/Firefox/Google Chrome)." The abbreviations used in that statement are "FF" for the Firefox browser, "IE" for Microsoft Internet Explorer and "GC for Google Chrome. Somewhat similar changes to the browsers, search engines, and start pages are common in other software products. Some of these toolbars and related changes redirect searches and modify search results, collect referral commissions from commercial websites such as Amazon and eBay, and provide other sources of revenue to the software author. There is nothing illegal about this entire process, as the user can easily opt not to install a toolbar or change any settings, and the intended software will still install and run properly.

The reason why I mention what many popular software publishers do in order to generate the necessary revenue to continue to produce software, is that many of these add-ons, search engine changes, toolbars, Active X components, Windows Services, and other changes and add-ons may adversely impact the speed and performance of the computer, as well as possibly skew search results to supporting sponsors, and to redirect purchases to affiliated vendors. WinPatrol is explicitly designed to intercept these changes and notify the user, giving him the choice to allow or block such installations or changes.

There is much more to WinPatrol than just protecting against potentially unwanted changes to your system; it includes 14 windows of information and data about what is running on the computer.

These 14 windows, tabbed in most builds of Windows, show Startup Programs, Delayed Start, IE Helpers, Scheduled Tasks, Services, ActiveX, Registry Monitoring, PLUS (information on the paid version), Options, Active Tasks, Cookies, File Types, Hidden Files, and Recent (recently run programs). Most of these 14 tabs give the user an easy to understand method of controlling what is running on the computer. For example, the Startup Programs tab displays the programs that load when the computer is booted; often, many of the programs are unnecessary, and can be removed from the boot sequence. speeding computer boot times. Alternatively, convenience programs that are desired to load, but not totally necessary, can be moved to the Delayed Start list, and automatically loaded some time after boot. The Scheduled Tasks displays software that is intended to run at specific times, such as updating utilities,



scanners, and other periodically run programs. Users often complain about how long it takes for a browser, such as Internet Explorer, to load; the IE Helpers tab displays those plug-ins and toolbars loaded with Internet Explorer, information on each, and the option to selectively remove them from the browser, speeding up the loading process. The Registry Monitoring tracks changes made to the registry, and allows the user to change or remove any recent changes to the registry. Many users

are concerned about the cookies stored on their computers; these little bits of data can be necessary or can be used to track the users online activities, sometimes that information being sold to third parties; the Cookies tab can display the stored cookies and give the user the opportunity to selectively delete any unwanted cookies. These are but a few of the many control functions provided to users of WinPatrol.

According to the WinPatrol website, "WinPatrol works and plays well with others. WinPatrol runs on Windows XP, Vista, Windows 7, Windows 8.x, & supports Windows 64 bit features without conflicts with other programs. The addition of WinPatrol provides a layered security approach required when even legitimate programs try to install unwanted toolbars." WinPatrol is available as a fully functional free utility or as a paid "PLUS" version with additional functions and features. The fee for the PLUS version is a one-time fee which entitles the user to all future updates and upgrades at no additional charge. At present, for household use, there are two purchase options for the PLUS version; the PLUS Lifetime License is \$29.95 and covers a single user on unlimited computers, including future computer purchases with a compatible operating system; the license is on the user, not the machine, so there is no problem if the PLUS version is used simultaneously on a desktop and laptop computer, as well as any future purchases. The Lifetime Family Pack, which is what I have, is \$49.95, and can be used by the entire family on an unlimited number of computers, including future purchases. There are other one-time license fees for bulk users, such as businesses and schools, that offer quantity discounts for the purchase of 10 or more licenses.

WinPatrol is the product of an all-American small business, headed by Bill Pytlovany, located in Scotia, New York. Bill Pytlovany releases frequent updates and upgrades in order to deal with new "zero day" exploits that may appear and attempt to hijack a computer. Bill Pytlovany says that, "WinPatrol continues to add unique features and remains the smallest, fastest system monitor of its kind." As I type this, the latest version of WinPatrol is 30.9, dated April 22, 2014; it is likely that one of the very frequent updates will be released by the time that you read this.

If you feel that you can use an added layer of protection against hijacks and system changes, protections often not included in other security products, WinPatrol may be just the product that you are looking for...

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
